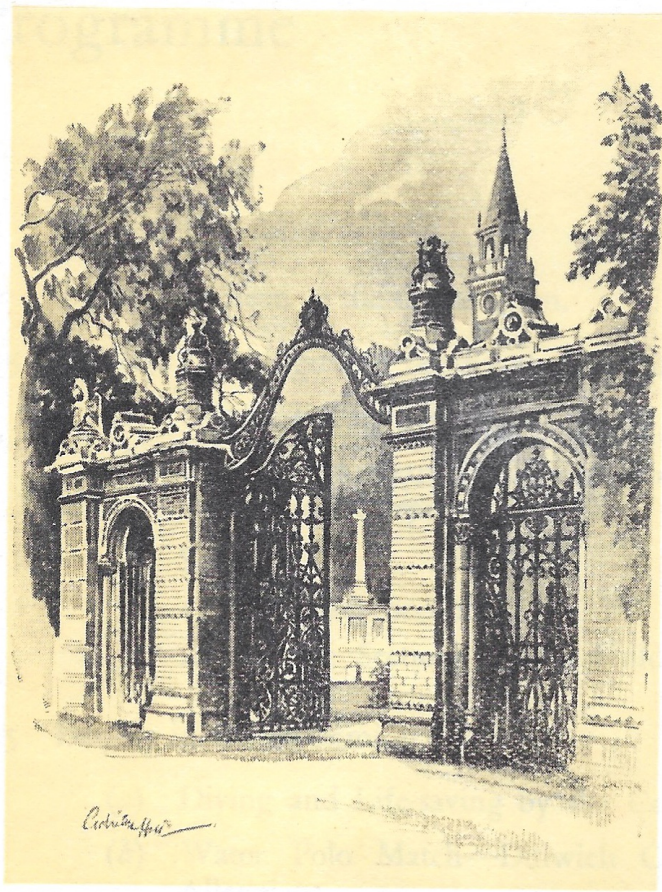

The Old College

The College was built to Edward Alleyn's requirements by John Benson in 1616. The original buildings have been restored and enlarged from time to time. The tower and cloisters were rebuilt by Charles Barry in 1865.

The fine wrought-iron gates of early 17th century workmanship, at the village end of the garden, are especially noteworthy.

The buildings are now used for the almshouses of the original charity, the offices of the Estates Governors, and the residence of the Chaplain of the College. The last-named portion contains several rooms of interest, and these by courtesy of the Chaplain, Rev. R. P. Crabbe, M.A., will be open to visitors from 3.30 to 4 p.m.

The Chapel

Christ's Chapel of Alleyn's College of God's Gift was consecrated by the Archbishop of Canterbury on 1st September, 1616, on Edward Alleyn's birthday, three years before Letters Patent were granted for the College. It is now the Chapel for the whole Foundation (Dulwich College, Alleyn's School, The James Allen's Girl School, and the pensioners) and "all the dwellers in the Hamlet of Dulwich." Edward Alleyn was buried there on 27th November, 1626, and in 1816 the existing black marble slab was placed to mark his tomb in the choir, and the old stone was removed to the Cloisters, where it may still be seen.

Interesting points to notice are the font, designed by James Gibbs, the famous architect, in 1729, with its Palindrome inscription round the edge of the cover—the wording in Greek being the same read either way and the English translation being: "Wash away sin, not the visage only"; the reredos, which was erected in 1911 as a memorial to Dr. A. J. Carver, the first Master of the College after the reconstitution in 1857; the panelling on the South Wall, containing the names of old boys of the College and of Alleyn's School and

members of the congregation who gave their lives in the Great War—the cross in the quadrangle, designed by W. D. Caroe, is also erected to their memory—and the fine copy of Raphael's Transfiguration (the original is in the Vatican at Rome), which was made by Julio Romano and presented to the Chapel by Thomas Mills in 1796, and until 1878 served as the altar-piece.

The Chapel possesses some valuable and interesting Communion Plate, including a silver-gilt chalice of the date 1599 and an alms dish of 1668. The Chaplain will be in attendance from 3.30 to 4 p.m. and will be pleased to show the plate to those interested.

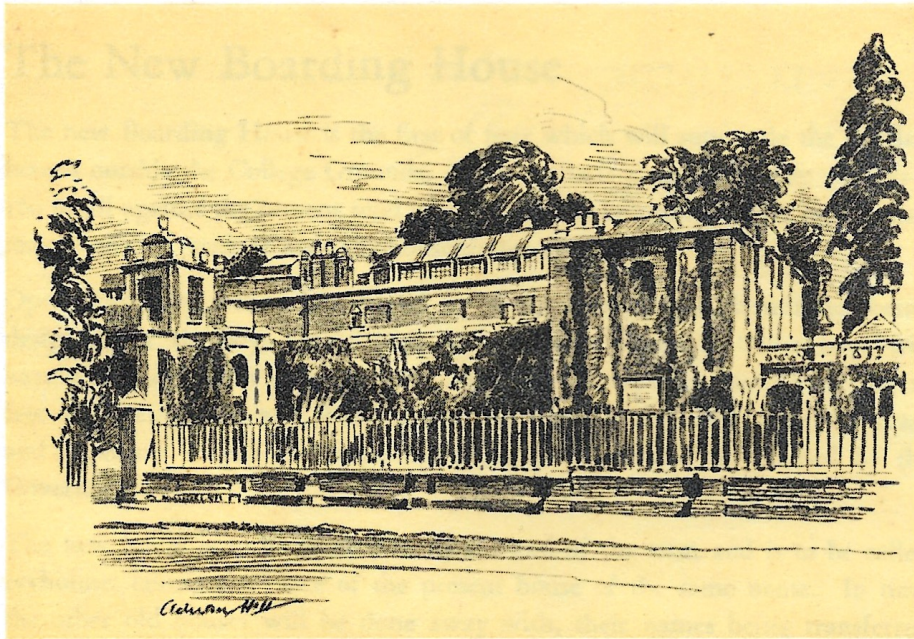
The Picture Gallery

The main part of the Picture Gallery was built in 1814 to the designs of Sir John Soane to house the collection of pictures made by Noel Desenfans for the national gallery at Warsaw and bequeathed to the College by Sir Peter Bourgeois, R.A. A number of pictures left to the College by Edward Alleyn and also those of the Cartwright bequest were brought together under the same roof. The building and its contents have been added to from time to time, and the collection is now one of world-wide importance.

'The Masters' Library

Little is known of the history of the Library or the provenance of its most important objects of interest. These are the MS. of Henslowe's Diary, the Alleyn Papers (these must have come from the Founder himself), a copy of Barnabe Rich's *Adventures of Brusanus*, a book of which only one other perfect copy is known to exist, an imperfect copy of the First Folio of Shakespeare, a first edition of one of Spencer's works, and a few *incunabula* of no very special interest. Some of the muniments go back to the 14th century. There is little doubt that the collection of MSS. has suffered grievously in the past from robbery, mutilation, and neglect. The chimney-piece of the room has a special interest, since it is made from part of Queen Elizabeth's state barge, of which Alleyn records the purchase in his diary.

The Library will be open to visitors from 3 to 4 p.m., when the Librarian, H. F. Hose, Esq. (O.A.), will be in attendance.



The Picture Gallery

The New Boarding House

The new Boarding House is the first of four which will supersede the existing houses outside the College Grounds. Each house is to accommodate 40 boys—160 in all against the present total of 110, and will be presided over by a house-master with a resident assistant housemaster or "tutor."

Open dormitory system is retained for younger boys, two dormitories being designed for six boys apiece with a "Common Room." Older boys will have a "room" each with air space above partitions, dimensions 7 feet by 13 feet and facing East and West, containing window seat, bed, table, bookcase and cupboard in oak, the furniture being provided and maintained by the Governors.

The new house is to be completed by the end of the term and is to be called Ivyholme, taking the place of the present house of the same name. In time the other old houses will be done away with, their names being transferred to the new buildings.

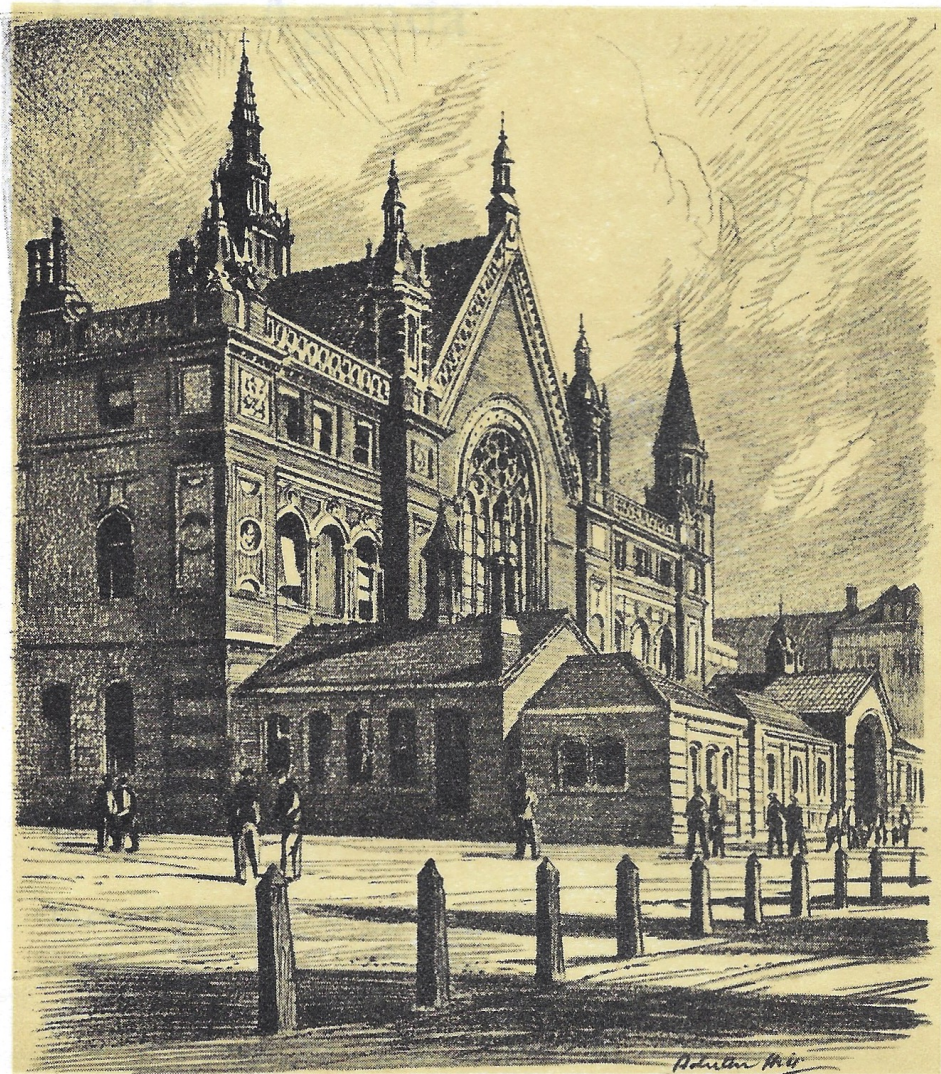

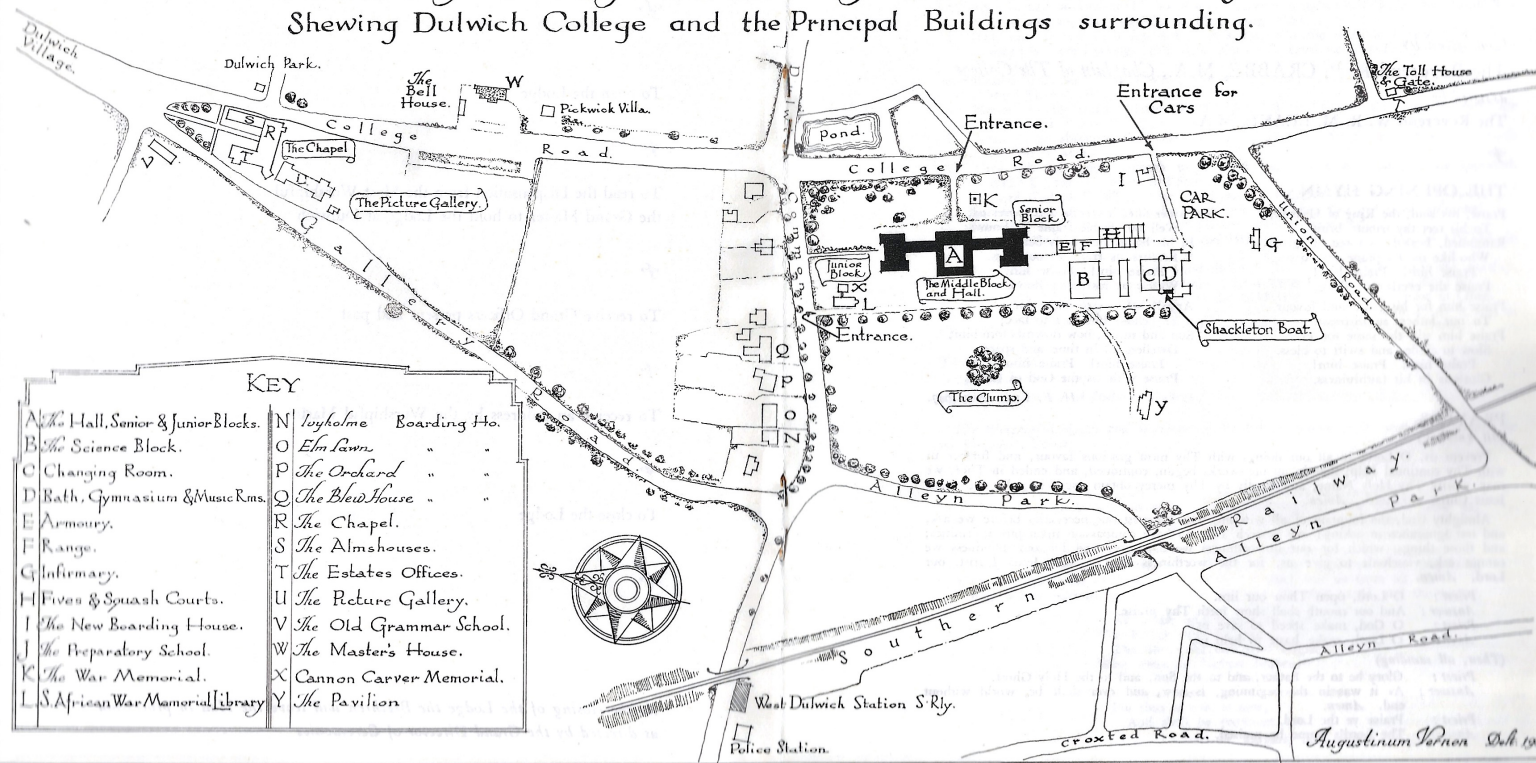

And that there never may be wanting a supply of persons duly qualified to serve God in Church and State, ye shall implore His special blessing on all Schools and Seminaries of Religious and wholesome learning, particularly on our Universities and Public Schools, and therein especially—as we are in this place bound to pray—on Dulwich College, the Governors, the Master of Dulwich College, the Head Master of Alleyn's School, the Head Mistress of James Allen's School, the Assistant Masters and Mistresses, and other Officers, the Almsmen and Almswomen, the Scholars and all other members past and present of this Ancient and Religious Foundation; that in this and all other places more immediately dedicated to God's honour and service, whatsoever tends to the advancement of true religion and sound learning may for ever flourish and abound.

To these your prayers ye shall add your unfeigned praises for mercies already received, for our creation, preservation, and all the blessings of this life; and as we in this place to-day are especially bound to add for the grace of faith and endurance which God bestowed upon those now departed to their rest, into whose heart He put it to establish this College of God's Gift, and the several branches thereof, particularly Edward Alleyn, our Founder, James Allen, William Cartwright, Peter Bourgeois, Margaret Desenfans, and John Whitfield; but, above all, for the inestimable love of God, our Heavenly Father, in the redemption of the world by our Lord Jesus Christ, for the means of grace and for the hope of glory.

Finally, ye shall praise God for all those which are departed out of this life in the faith of Christ, and pray unto God that we may have grace to direct our lives after their good example, that, this life ended, we may be partakers with them of the Glory of the Resurrection in the Life Everlasting, through our Lord Jesus Christ; by whose saving precepts bidden, and by whose Divine instruction taught, we are bold to say,

Our Father, which art in heaven, Hallowed be thy Name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, As we forgive them that trespass against us.
